Notice of Educational Options (WI Act 55)

Pursuant to 2015 Wisconsin Act 55 section 118.57 of the state statute, the Three Lakes School District offers the following education options. In addition, the Three Lakes School District accountability report that is published by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) can be found on the DPI website.

The District's primary educational pathway for students involves a progression from 4-year-old Kindergarten through 12th grade, leading to a high school diploma.

The District's schools are listed below:

- Sugar Camp Elementary School (PK-6)
- Three Lakes Elementary School (PK-6)
- Three Lakes Junior High School (7-8)
- Three Lakes High School (9-12)

Educational programs offered to eligible students who are enrolled in and attending the District's schools include:

- Early Childhood special education (for children who qualify for these services and are at least 3 years of age but not yet school age).
- Special education programming for students with disabilities.
- Gifted and Talented.
- Individualized program and curriculum modifications, including at-risk and alternative education programming.
- Career and technical education (CTE) programs.
- FAB Lab.

Educational options for students who are enrolled in the Three Lakes School District that involve full or part-time attendance at an educational institution other than a school of the Three Lakes School District include the following:

- Start College Now
- Early College Credit School
- WI Challenge Academy
- Rural Virtual Academy
